

t's the holiday season (Thanksgiving to New Year's) and a wonderful time of the year. This is a time of giving thanks, celebrating the birth of Jesus, and looking forward (hopefully) to a New Year with new goals, hopes, and possibilities.

However, sometimes we forget that Thanksgiving has its roots in the power and courage of a small group of Christians who were willing to take a stand for what they believed. They were willing to call out what was wrong and declare what was right as given by Scripture. They were willing to make their faith more than just a fad, or a generational acknowledgment of faith, but a true and sincere part of the very fabric of what they believed, how they saw the world, and how they would respond to God.

"WHO WILL**TAKE** STAND **FOR** 



We all want our kids to grow in their faith; to read their Bibles, to pray, to love Jesus deeply. But if we're honest, sometimes we expect those habits to appear without ever showing them how. Oof, that one hits close to home! The truth is, the best way to teach faith isn't by telling our kids what to do, but by letting them see us follow Jesus in our everyday lives.

### The Mandate We've Already Been Given

In Deuteronomy 6, God gives parents a clear command: "These words that I command you today shall be on your heart. Teach them diligently to your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up."

This isn't meant to be a checklist, but a way of life; living by faith in Jesus and bringing Him into the daily moments. Small habits add up to a big faith.

### What Are Spiritual Disciplines?

Spiritual disciplines are practices that help us connect with Jesus. Things like reading Scripture, praying, worshiping, serving, resting, and showing gratitude.

For kids, these can look really simple:

- **1. Reading Scripture:** a verse a day, a Bible story before bed, or a fun reading challenge.
- Prayer: thanking God out loud in the car, praying for a friend, or writing "Dear God" notes.
- **3. Worship:** singing in the car, at church, or around the house.

- 4. Serving: doing something kind for a friend or helping at home.
- **5. Gratitude:** naming one thing they're thankful for before bed.
- **6. Rest:** learning that it's okay to slow down and spend quiet time with God.

When we model these habits, kids start to see that following Jesus is a daily relationship, not just something we do on Sundays.

### **Habits Take Time**

Research shows it takes around 66 days to form a new habit. So if routines feel awkward or you miss a few days, don't stress. What matters most is progress, not perfection. Growth happens one step at a time.

# Why Modeling Matters More Than Mandating

Kids learn more from our example than from our rules. When they see us open our Bible, not out of obligation but because we want to, they notice. When they see us pause to pray before a big decision, they see dependence on God. And when they hear us say, "I messed up, but I'm thankful for grace," they start to understand the Gospel better than any Sunday lesson could teach.

We can't expect kids to build habits if we don't practice ourselves. Let them see us walk with God honestly, not perfectly.

### **Small Ways to Start**

If you're ready to start building faith habits at home, keep it simple:

- 1. Pick one thing. Read a verse together at breakfast. Pray before bed. Say one thing you're thankful for on the way to school.
- 2. Tie it to something you already do. Habits stick better when they're linked to existing routines like reading a Psalm after dinner or praying before brushing teeth.
- 3. Make it visible. Leave your Bible out, write verses on sticky notes, and let your kids see what matters to you.

Every small moment adds up.





Parenting has seasons too. One minute you're carrying diaper bags and Goldfish crackers, and the next you're sitting in the carpool line while your kid tells you all about multiplication or middle school drama. These seasons fly by, and they rarely come back around. That's why we can't just *notice* the change, we have to *embrace* it.

So what does that mean for us as parents right now? It means we seize this season.

- 4. Trade an hour of screen time for a slow dinner around the table.

The truth is, we can't freeze time. But we can make the most of it. Every little moment, every walk, every laugh, every prayer whispered together becomes part of your child's memory of what "family" felt like.

Parents, the heat has broken, the season is shifting. Don't let it just pass you by. Seize the day with your children, and fill this season with presence, joy, and faith.

Prayers for you and your family for a Happy Thanksgiving! Mine and my family's lives are truly more blessed with you in our lives!









Jesus Christ is the Son of God and the greatest teacher the world has ever known. His words carry wisdom and divine authority. While on Earth, He didn't merely speak like the rabbis or scholars of His day. When Jesus spoke, hearts were stirred. His teaching wasn't full of empty tradition or religious cliches. It cut straight to the soul. And one of His favorite ways to teach was through parables.

It's true that parables weren't new in Jewish culture, but Jesus used them in a way no one else ever had. Where rabbis used stories to teach the Law of Moses, Jesus used them to reveal the mysteries of God's Kingdom. His parables invited renewed reflection. They were simple enough for a child to understand, yet profound enough to challenge the most educated mind. For those who truly wanted to know God, His stories were full of light. But for those who hardened their hearts, they remained hidden in mystery.

The word *parable* comes from two Greek words meaning "to throw alongside." Essentially, a parable is a truth laid next to a story. It's something relatable that helps to explain something eternal. But Jesus' parables were more than illustrations; they were tests of the heart. For instance, after telling the story of the sower, He said, "He who has ears, let him hear" (Matt. 13:9). Some would listen and understand. Others would not. The parables of Christ revealed who was truly seeking God… "For the word of God is alive and active…it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart." (Heb. 4:12).

When the disciples asked why He taught this way, Jesus answered, "To you has been given the secret of the kingdom of God, but for those outside everything is in parables" (Mark 4:11). Those who were hungry for truth would find it; those who weren't would walk away unchanged. His parables were both an invitation *and* a dividing line.

At the center of these stories is the Gospel of Jesus. It's the good news of God's Kingdom breaking into the world. That message begins with Jesus Himself: God's reign arriving in grace and power. The parables show us how that Kingdom grows, transforms, and demands our full devotion.

Later in this article, I will also give some advice on how you can interpret these teachings of our Lord. But first, this month at Young Adults Sunday Night Worship, we will look at four of Jesus' parables.

# The Parable of the Sower (Matthew 13:1-23)

Jesus told of a farmer scattering seed across four kinds of soil: a hard path, rocky ground, thorny ground, and good soil. Each represents a different kind of heart and how it receives God's Word. Some hearts are hard: truth never takes root. Others are shallow: a superficial faith springs up quickly but withers in hardship. Some hearts are crowded: choked by worry, wealth, and distractions. But the good soil receives the Word deeply and produces an abundant harvest.

This parable reminds us that hearing God's Word is more than listening with our ears; it's allowing His truth to transform us. It's a picture of how the Spirit prepares our hearts to receive life. True faith begins with a heart made alive by God. The question Jesus asks each of us is personal: *What kind of soil am I?* 

# The Parable of the Wheat and the Weeds (Matthew 13:24–43)

In this story, a farmer plants good seed, but an enemy secretly sows weeds among it. As the plants grow, the difference isn't clear. The servants want to pull up the weeds, but the farmer says to wait... if they act too soon, they might destroy the wheat. At harvest time, the two will be separated. The wheat will be gathered, and the weeds will be burned.

God's Kingdom exists in a world full of evil. Good and evil grow side by side for now, but judgment is coming. God's patience doesn't mean He's passive; it means He's merciful, giving people time to repent. The parable calls us to stay faithful in a world that's mixed and messy, trusting that God will one day make all things right.

# The Parables of the Mustard Seed and the Leaven (Matthew 13:31–35)

These short stories reveal the surprising way God's Kingdom grows. Jesus said the Kingdom is like a mustard seed, which is tiny at first, but it becomes a large tree where birds can rest. Then He compared it to yeast that works through the dough until the whole loaf is transformed.

Both images remind us that God often works in quiet, unseen ways. The Kingdom may start small (a conversation, an act of kindness, a prayer) but it carries unstoppable power. God's Word transforms lives, families, and even cultures from the inside out. We should not despise small beginnings or slow growth. The object of our faith (Christ) is more important than the size of it (mustard seed). What God plants, He will bring to bear fruit!

# The Parables of the Hidden Treasure and the Pearl (Matthew 13:44–46)

In two short parables, Jesus shows the priceless value of His Kingdom. A man finds a treasure buried in a field and happily sells everything to buy it. Also, a merchant finds a pearl so valuable that he gives up everything to acquire it.

The message is simple: the Kingdom of God is worth *everything*. These parables ask us to examine our hearts: What do I value most? Am I holding onto something that keeps me from fully embracing Jesus? It's not about earning salvation; it's about recognizing its inestimable value. It takes an irreplaceable item to obtain a priceless object. When you see Christ for who He truly is, nothing else compares.

# How to Read Parables Well

Parables aren't meant to be riddles filled with hidden codes. Most of them make one main point. It's tempting to over-analyze every detail, but Jesus' stories were designed to draw us toward one central truth.

Here are a few helpful ways to read them:

- Pay attention to context. Notice how Jesus introduces the story. He often begins with "The Kingdom of Heaven is like..."
- Look for the main point. Don't get distracted by side details or "spiritualizing" every single aspect of the story.
- Let Scripture interpret Scripture. Parables never contradict the rest of God's Word.

Many parables even come with Jesus' own explanation, like the Parable of the Sower or the Weeds. When we're unsure, we can trust the rest of Scripture to bring clarity.

### Why Jesus Used Parables

Jesus didn't tell stories just to entertain us or to make faith "simple." He told parables to reveal truth to those who were ready and conceal it from those who refused to listen. His stories invite the humble and challenge the proud. They awaken faith or expose unbelief.

To the seeking heart, a parable is a treasure. To the hardened heart, it's a mystery. They reveal who we really are.

It's often said that a parable is "an earthly story with a heavenly meaning." But it's even more than that, it's a key to the Kingdom. It unlocks truth for those who have ears to hear.

So as you reflect on these stories, don't just ask, *What does this mean?*Ask, *What is God saying to me?*And most of all, *do I have ears to hear?* 

# A DROP FROM THE ALTAR by Sam LoBello

One of my seminary professors used to say to his class while teaching, "This is a drop from the altar." He was communicating to his students that what he was about to say was important and may well appear on the next test. As a result, it would be wise for us to remember it.

As I have journeyed through life God has given me "Drops from the Altar" from time to time. I have tried to remember them and apply them to my life. I will share one with you each month. I hope you find them to be helpful in your journey, as well.

# **Engaging Our Youth:** The Transformative Power of Student Ministry

In a world where our teenagers face more distractions and challenges than ever before, the role of student ministries is not just valuable, it's vital. Our junior high and high school students need a place where they can encounter the love of Christ, be equipped with biblical truth, and find a community of believers who encourage spiritual growth. At our church, we offer a place for you: Sunday School at 8:45 AM in the Family Life Center, and our dynamic Wednesday night service from 6:30 to 7:30 PM.

### The Numbers Speak:

A 2023 Barna study revealed that teens who attend church weekly are three times more likely to engage in spiritual practices daily, such as prayer and Bible reading, than those who don't attend at all. Additionally, research from the National Study of Youth and Religion found that students highly involved in a youth group were 40% more likely to retain their faith into adulthood.

Conversely, students who disengage from church during their teenage years often experience a decline in mental health and spiritual identity. According to Lifeway Research, 66% of teens stop attending church between the ages of 18 and 22, many citing a lack of connection as a major factor.

### **Ephesians 4:12-13 (NASB):**

"...for the equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for the building up of the body of Christ; until we all attain to the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to a mature man, to the measure of the stature which belongs to the fullness of Christ." The Greek word for 'equip' (καταρτισμός - katartismos) implies complete furnishing or perfecting. Student ministries are designed to equip and fully furnish our young people with the tools of spiritual maturity.

### Voices from the Past:

Dwight L. Moody once said, "If I could relive my life, I would devote my entire ministry to reaching children for God."

This statement underscores the long-standing value of youth-focused

discipleship. Charles Spurgeon similarly noted: "Train up a child in the way he should go—but be sure you go that way yourself."

### **Our Church's Commitment:**

We meet students where they are. Our Sunday morning class (8:45 AM in the Family Life Center) offers a welcoming environment for studying the Bible and sharing life. Our Wednesday night service (6:30–7:30 PM) is more than a midweek gathering; it's a spiritual recharge filled with worship, relevant teaching, and peer fellowship.

### **Transformed Lives:**

Every month, we at Live Oak hear testimonies from students who have overcome addiction, abuse, anxiety, and identity issues. In student ministry groups, they find companionship and truth.

Parents, Grandparents, and Guardians—We Need You!
Encourage your teens to participate. Don't make church optional.
Drive them, pray for them, and attend with them. Faith doesn't grow in isolation.

# Let's heed the wisdom of Proverbs 22:6 (NASB):

"Train up a child in the way he should go, even when he grows older he will not abandon it."

In this season, let's commit to raising up a generation that knows the Lord, walks in His truth, and serves His kingdom. Student ministries are not a side program; they are the frontline of spiritual formation. We hope to see you Sunday at 8:45 for Sunday School and Wednesday at 6:30 for Student Ministry services!

# Women on a Mission






